#### 06. Hydroponics for Home Food Production

Hydroponics, a method of growing plants in water instead of soil, is becoming increasingly popular for growing food indoors. In the dead of winter, you can easily be growing lettuce, herbs, or other vegetables in your own home. This program will demonstrate how easy making an at home hydroponic system can be. Candice will discuss the basics of how hydroponics works, the material needed to build a system, and the maintenance required. Participants can make their own system to take home.

#### 11. Kokedama String Gardening

String gardening is a term that has become attached to a style of Japanese bonsai known as Kokedama, which literally means "moss ball" in English. To create these "moss balls," a plant is taken out of its pot, most of its soil removed, and is inserted into a ball of soil held together with moss and string. They are then hung from decorative string. Learn from Candice the history of these interesting plantings, the exact process of making a string garden, and the specific care instructions. You'll have the opportunity to make your own moss ball in this hands-on
